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## A Solomonic split

November 18, 2002-- Large spaces suitable for manufacturing companies can be tricky to find in the city.

Even so, when the former Kentile Flooring Co. building went on the market as a 500,000 square-footer in Park Slope, it sat without a taker for months.

"Nobody could quite match the price," says John Maltz of brokerage company Greiner-Maltz. The owner, window shade company Achim Distributors, was giving up the space to consolidate.

But broker David Junik of Greiner-Maltz was determined. He studied the building, which borders the Gowanus Canal, and discovered a way to separate a chunk so it could be marketed as two lower-priced properties.

The split created one space of 400,000 square feet, which was snapped up by Regal Home Collection, a maker of draperies. The smaller space, 95,000 square feet, is now home to Architectural Grille, a company that makes high-end decorative grilles.

Their combined purchase price was \$20 million in separate deals that closed within a month of each other.
